PROGRESS ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE POST-2020 FRAMEWORK



UPDATES FOR PROTEUS PARTNERS: THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE POST-2020 GLOBAL BIODIVERSITY FRAMEWORK AND OPPORTUNITIES TO ENGAGE WITH THE PROCESS

A number of steps have been taken towards the development of the post-2020 global biodiversity framework since the November 2018 UN Biodiversity Conference. These meetings and documents will shape the future global biodiversity agenda and have implications for the extractives sector. Here, we summarise progress to date of relevance to Proteus Partners and identify opportunities for engagement.

OVERVIEW

The post-2020 global biodiversity framework has undergone meaningful development since the last update to Proteus Partners in December 2018.

This briefing note outlines the outcomes from selected meetings, and provides an update on the development of associated documents. It also highlights opportunities for Proteus Partners to engage in the process.

UN ENVIRONMENT ASSEMBLY (UNEA)

The fourth session of the UN Environment Assembly (<u>UNEA 4</u>) was held in Nairobi, Kenya in March 2019. The theme was 'Innovative solutions for environmental challenges and sustainable consumption and production'.

UNEA 4 included negotiations on resolutions of relevance to business, including those on 'Addressing environmental challenges through sustainable business practices' and sustainable infrastructure. The resolution on biodiversity was largely supportive of coordinating efforts on the various biodiversity-related conventions and decisions already taken elsewhere, including those on the post-2020 global biodiversity framework.

KEEPING PROTEUS PARTNERS UP TO DATE

This is the second in a series of briefing notes and webinars on the Convention on Biological Diversity, including progress towards the post-2020 global biodiversity framework and opportunities for engagement.

POST-2020 FRAMEWORK REGIONAL CONSULTATION MEETINGS

The Convention on Biological Diversity has convened a number of regional consultation meetings to gather input on the possible scope and content of the post-2020 global biodiversity framework. Once completed, the reports of these meetings are made available online. Inputs from the meeting reports published to date include:

- the need for a quantitative approach, including better/increased use of indicators for monitoring progress and contributions;
- more emphasis on mainstreaming biodiversity;
- greater focus on investment in natural capital and nature-based solutions;
- stronger linkages with the <u>Sustainable</u>
 <u>Development Goals</u> (SDGs); and
- better articulation of actions requested of the private sector to facilitate their engagement.

The final regional consultation workshop, for Latin America and the Caribbean, was held in Montevideo, Uruguay between the 14th and 17th May 2019. The outcomes of the meetings will be collated, along with comment submissions on the associated documents (see 'Post-2020 Document Preparation') to help inform discussions on what the framework will include and its structure.

POST-2020 DOCUMENT PREPARATION

The Secretariat to the Convention on Biological Diversity has produced a number of documents relating to the development of the post-2020 global biodiversity framework, all of which are available on the Convention's Post-2020 website. The consultation on the initial discussion paper closed on 15th April 2019. The submissions received can be viewed online here.

It is anticipated that a discussion paper based on these (and other) inputs will be released for comment between mid-May and 15th August 2019. The discussion paper

will focus on the possible content of the post-2020 global biodiversity framework. Comments from all stakeholders, are welcome. This is a key opportunity for the private sector to engage in the process.

OPPORTUNITIES TO ENGAGE

Upcoming opportunities for business to engage with the development of the post-2020 framework are outlined in Table 1 and include:

- responding to calls for inputs into documents;
- participating in the open-ended intersessional working group in August 2019 (registration is requested before 31st July 2019 more information on this event can be found here); and
- participating in <u>meetings and other events</u>.
